Action Grant Community Meeting

You are invited to provide input on four new neighborhood amenities that will be coming to Russell during the coming year. These projects, which will be funded with a \$1,000,000 Choice Neighborhood Initiative Action grant from HUD and \$375,000 from the Louisville Metro Government, include:

- improvements to Sheppard Park including a spray ground:
- the installation of up to five smART Stop bus shelters:
- neighborhood gateway murals painted on portions of the railway overpasses that run north to south between 13th and 15th streets; and
- the development of new amenities on four or five vacant lots.

A community meeting has been scheduled for Monday, April 24th at 6 p.m. at the Louisville Urban League (1535 W. Broadway, Louisville, KY 40203) to collect ideas and input from residents of the Russell neighborhood.

Beecher Terrace First Phase Update

The first phase of Beecher Terrace redevelopment will include a 120-unit building for residents age 55+. First preference for these new units will be given to Beecher residents. This four-story building will be located on the northern half of Old Walnut Park between 9th and 10th streets, and construction is expected to begin in late 2017 or early 2018.

Remember, please do NOT move, as moving will jeopardize your relocation benefits. You will soon receive a letter from the Louisville Metro Housing Authority with more details about the upcoming relocation process, your relocation options and benefits, and the general timeframe for relocation.

A meeting to discuss specific details about relocation has been scheduled for Beecher Terrace residents on Monday, April 17th at the Baxter Community Center at 6 p.m.

Genetta received an Associate of Arts degree from **Jefferson Community and Technical** College and will graduate from the University of Louisville this May with a Bachelor of Science in Public Health.

Fresh Stops

Fresh Stop Markets are "pop up" farm-fresh food markets set up at local churches, community centers and other neighborhood centers that provide produce to fresh food insecure neighborhoods. The Russell neighborhood Fresh Stop will



be returning to the Joshua Tabernacle Missionary Baptist Church, 426 S. 15th Street, on every other Saturday starting June 17 from 10 a.m.-noon.

The cost of shares at all Fresh Stops are set on a sliding scale based on income. The scale is as follows:

- Shares are \$6 for families on WIC.
- Shares are \$12 for families who receive SNAP/ EBT/Food Stamps or others with limited resources.
- Shares are \$25 for families with higher incomes.
- NEW!!! You can also purchase a Food Justice Share. Pay \$40 (retail price of the share). This will put more money in the pot so all can eat!

Everyone gets the same exact food regardless of what is paid. No one is turned away for lack of resources. To place an order for seasonal shares call (502) 509-6770 (debit/credit or SNAP), or drop off cash at Joshua Tabernacle Missionary Baptist Church, Monday through Friday between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.

LCCC Teen Leadership Council



The Teen Leadership Council (T.L.C.) at Louisville Central Community Centers (LCCC) is a group of young individuals who come together twice a week to discuss ways they can benefit their community while gaining professional skills that prepare them for college. "The T.L.C.

provides an outline for career and college readiness," said MaNya Hillman, T.L.C. president. The young leaders coordinate resources for their own advancement, such as ACT preparation and leadership workshops, and for advancement of the community through volunteering and hosting events that are open to the public.

The T.L.C. also provides an opportunity for students to earn scholarship money for college, while developing skills that will help them succeed. "I used to be very quiet and often didn't like talking. But I often find myself providing ideas and taking charge in our Teen Leadership Council meetings," said Gia Combs, who will be attending University of Louisville next Fall. The T.L.C. is open to students aged 13-18 who are interested in getting involved with the community and gaining skills to prepare for college.

The T.L.C. is currently organizing their third Vision 5K - a 5 kilometer run and walk that will highlight the vision that has been developed for west of 9th Street. This annual fundraising event will take place Saturday, May 20th with registration starting at 7:30 a.m. at the LCCC, 1300 W. Muhammad Ali Boulevard. Talayeh Cunningham says planning the Vision 5K has taught her how to organize community events and Jaylah Bailey, who is serving as marketing chair for the event, has developed marketing and planning skills.
