DID YOU KNOW?

-Starting in kindergarten, too many absences can cause children to fall behind in school.

-Missing 10% of school days (18 days) can make it harder for children to learn how to read.

-Chronic absences can impact the whole classroom due to the teacher having to slow down learning to help children who've been absent to catch up.



Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP)

Subsidy Phase and Early Registrations

Louisville Metro Office of Resilience and Community Services' LIHEAP Program is a federally funded program that provides financial assistance to help low-income residents pay utility bills. The Subsidy component of LIHEAP will begin November 5, 2018.

Applicants must be Jefferson County residents within 130% of the federal poverty guidelines and willing to provide the documentation below.

- Proof of all household income for the preceding month (Food Stamp award letter, Social Security Award letter, pay stubs, etc. or proof of \$0 income. Note: Zero Income forms are available at the Community Services office at 701 W. Ormsby Ave., Suite 201.)
- Proof of Social Security Number or Permanent Residence card (Green Card) for each member of the household.
- Most current heating bill; or statement from your landlord if heating expenses are included in your rent; or statement from your utility company if you participate in a pre-pay electric program. Please bring the account number and name on the account for all heating fuel sources and electric.

Personally, Jamal loves to sing in the choir, travel, cook, read, watch sports, and attend concerts. He is looking forward to working with the families of Beecher Terrace.










READ FOR THE RECORD



USI Louisville staff recently participated in Jumpstart's annual Read for the Record campaign. Launched over a decade ago, this national initiative brings together millions of people each year in classrooms, libraries, community centers and homes across the U.S.

The goal of *Read for the Record* is to highlight the importance of building early literacy and language skills for EVERY CHILD, so that all children have the opportunity to enter kindergarten prepared to succeed. Increasing

kindergarten readiness is also a key goal of our Russell Choice Neighborhood Initiative

The mission of Russell Reads is to foster equity through family literacy, community engagement and life-long learning opportunities. This new reading initiative will emphasize parents and other adults as childrens' first teachers and focus on increasing learning beyond the traditional school setting.

As part of Russell Reads, ongoing literacy events will

be held throughout the community including scheduled story hours with guest readers and authors, book clubs and poetry slams. An Ambassador Leader Network will also be established as part of the initiative, along with a passport system to incentivize reading.
