## Officials Celebrate Phase I Groundbreaking: Let the Construction Begin!

Federal, state and local officials joined Russell and Beecher Terrace residents and community stakeholders on March 29<sup>th</sup> to celebrate the start of construction for the first phase of new development at the Beecher Terrace site. Representatives from the Russell Neighborhood Association, the Department of Housing and Urban Development, Kentucky Housing Corporation, Ohio Capital Housing, Red Capital Group, McCormack Baron Salazar and the Louisville Metro Housing Authority also helped celebrate, and Mayor Greg Fischer announced a naming contest for the site at the ceremony (see page 3 for details).



#### Profile: Erica Bledsaw - A Passion for Performance

There are some people who spend years trying to discover their passion and purpose in life, and then there are people like Erica Denise Bledsaw whose passion is evident long before they are willing to embrace it. But if you've ever attended a play produced by Bledsaw, or seen her perform at a local theatre, it's difficult to imagine her doing anything else.

"As a child, I would do these elaborate plays using my dolls and friends as the actors and props," said Bledsaw who has been participating in arts since she was a student at Greathouse Shyrock Elementary School. "But when it came time for college, I was encouraged to choose a safer path than a career in the arts, so I majored in business."

After graduating from Sullivan University with a degree in business, Bledsaw served in a number of jobs that allowed her to put her education to good use, including a stint with Jefferson County Public Schools. But during this time, her interest and passion for the arts, particularly the performing arts, never faded.

"I still viewed the arts as a hobby rather than something I could make a living doing, but I continued to be active in community theatre scene and did some freelance work so that I could remain connected to the local arts world," Bledsaw said. In fact, it was while Bledsaw was sitting in her car waiting to perform in a local play that she had an idea on how to turn her passion into a full-time job.


"The arts have the ability to bring people together and yet there's a shortage of affordable opportunities, especially in west Louisville, for kids to be a part of these programs," said Bledsaw. "So, I had the idea to start a performing arts camp for kids that would provide students something to do after school."

With a clear vision in place, Bledsaw set up a GoFundMe page to help cover the cost for the camp. This effort eventually led her to the Louisville Central Community Centers, where she now serves as Manager of Youth Education. While participating in one of LCCC's theatre troupes, students not only develop performing skills but also work to improve their academic performance.

"We have high expectations for the students in our theatre troupes both inside and outside of the classroom," said Bledsaw. "We have an academic coach that helps

them with their work and helps to ensure they are being just as successful in the classroom as they are on stage."

Her approach has allowed LCCC's fine arts program to grow from just seven kids to 52 kids who participate in the full-scale production of up to six shows

"When we begin practicing for a play, I always start the first rehearsal the same way. I remind the kids that the next eight weeks can either be the best or worst experience of their life and, ultimately, only they can decide which way it will go," Bledsaw said. "Helping them to understand that whatever they choose to do in life, their attitude will determine their overall experience is important."

As Bledsaw considers the changes taking place throughout the Russell neighborhood, she hopes that current residents are able to remain in the historic neighborhood and enjoy the benefits from the improvements being made.

"I feel very fortunate to be a part of the changes that are taking place in the Russell neighborhood and see the revitalization as a great opportunity to reach even more kids," said Bledsaw who is enrolled full-time at the Kentucky College of Art and Design pursuing a degree in fine arts. "As the redevelopment moves forward, and it is important that current residents not only benefit from the improvements but also play an active role and drive what this neighborhood becomes."
