DEFINITIONS:

MINORITY BUSINESS ENTERPRISE (MBE)

A business that is fifty-one percent (51%) or more owned, managed or operated by at least one of the following groups:

- African Americans
- Hispanic Americans
- Asian Americans
- Native Americans
- Hasidic Jewish Americans

WOMEN BUSINESS ENTERPRISE (WBE)

A business that is at least fifty-one percent (51%) owned, managed, or operated by one or more women, regardless of race

DISABLED BUSINESS ENTERPRISE (DBE)

A business that is at least fifty-one percent (51%) or more owned, managed, or operated by one or more disabled individuals

Don't work in housing or construction? That's okay!

Certifications are **<u>NOT</u>** industry specific.

POLICY:

Whenever possible, a MBE, WBE, or DBE business concern will be solicited in the competitive pricing and/or award process at LMHA.
