



Source B: Grace Jones, Our Values: Our Community, [4:11 min.] (Read aloud)


Annotation: This is a read of the children's book, Our Values: My Community to help define what a community is and the valuable parts.







Annotation: The provided images show the skyline of Louisville. The first image is from 1876 and the other is a modern photograph.


Image 1: Bird's eye view of Louisville, Kentucky 1876.
